Administers grazing on over a million acres of BLM public lands in Northwest Colorado

▶ Permits over 100,000 AUM's of livestock grazing within the field office

2022 BLM Range Program Accomplishments

- Renewed 9 number of grazing permits
- Assessed land health on 12 allotments
- Conducted the 2022 Piceance-East Douglas Horse Gather
- Worked with producers to plan and implement several new range improvement projects
- ▶ Initiated Vence (virtual livestock fencing) on 2 permits
- Signed 3 CRMP's and initiated 4 more CRMP's with the White River Conservation District
- Filled hydrologist vacancy for the field office

Rangeland Improvements

- ▶ BLM is continuously looking at projects to improve public rangelands.
- ▶ BLM has installed or is working to install numerous improvements such as solar water wells, water pipelines, brush control treatments, and riparian improvement projects
- ▶ BLM completed weed treatments on 720 acres in 2022
- ▶ BLM completed 14 brush treatments on 10,414 acres in 2022
- ▶ BLM completed numerous water developments across the field office in 2022

Wild Horses


- 2021 West Douglas horse gather removed 457 animals from the West Douglas Herd Area
- 2022 Piceance-East Douglas horse gather removed 867 animals from the Piceance-East Douglas HMA
- Reduced pressure on rangelands has already shown improvements in the Herd Management Areas and Herd Area
- Additional work to remove remaining excess wild horses from the range is and will continue to be a top priority for the White River Field Office

Past and Current Rangeland Conditions

- ▶ 2021: Severe drought across Field Office
- ▶ 2022: Slightly under average winter precipitation, good spring and summer precipitation. The region received favorable growing season precipitation. Most areas benefited from well-timed spring rain and reliable summer monsoon moisture.
- Very low fire activity in the field office for the 2022 fire season, which is an indicator of less fine fuels and significant monsoonal moisture.

2023 and Beyond

- With the arrival of new Field Manager Bill Mills, rangeland management/grazing is the #1 priority for the field office
- 2023 has started out with good winter precipitation so far, with snowpack near 150 percent of average
- Good residual cover carried over from the 2022 grazing season, will put the rangelands in a good position to start in spring 2023
- White River Field Office is working to implement stream restoration to improve erosion, reduce sediment loads and increase productivity of riparian vegetation
